 <p>Elderberry</p>	<p>Large clusters of fragrant white flowers attract pollinators June-July. Edible berries ripen to a deep red-purple. Birds and mammals relish the fruit.</p>	<p>up to 10'</p>	<p>Full, Partial</p>	<p>Medium-Wet, Medium, Medium-Dry</p>
 <p>American Hazelnut</p>	<p>American Hazelnut is a unisexual species, with separate male and female parts on the same branch; a single tree will produce nuts.</p>	<p>up to 8'</p>	<p>Full, Partial</p>	<p>Medium-Wet, Medium, Medium-Dry</p>
 <p>Prairie Ninebark</p>	<p>The June-flowering plants will begin as pink buds, opening to white. This same pink stage will appear again as the flowers turn to fruit.  <p>Highbush Cranberry</p>	<p>Spring will develop white flowers that resemble lace-cap hydrangeas; in summer, dense foliage provides habitat for wildlife, and in autumn, the bush will develop tart red berries before the leaves turn from yellow to purple-red in color.</p>	<p>Up to 12'</p>	<p>Full, Partial</p>	<p>Wet, Medium-Wet, Medium</p>
